THE OLD NATURE - (SERMON MP3)

Interact with the following statements and their connection with Genesis 20.

Believers are fallible and can relapse into sin at any stage of life.

The moral inconsistencies of believers can shame the name of the Lord.

Many times our greatest temptations follow on the heels of special blessings.

Our disobedience is often camouflaged by excuses obvious to all but ourselves.

Unresolved conflicts don't disappear, instead they have a way of resurfacing later in life.

The eternal security of a believer is rooted in God's grace, not good deeds.

Beware of the half-truth. vou may have gotten hold of the wrong half.

In (Genesis 20:11), we find that Abraham is living in _____ instead of faith. He is afraid of the Canaanites and so he engineers a deceptive solution to try to save his neck.

- Why do you think Abraham traveled to a new place after the destruction of Sodom and Gomorrah? What may have been the cause of the fear we see creep up in Abraham?
- What is the parallel between Abraham and Abimelech (Genesis 20:11), and Jonah and the ship's crew (Jonah 1:10)?
- Think of a difficult situation in which fear or unbelief led you to a course of action that didn't honor God. What were the consequences and lessons you learned?

In (Genesis 20:6) we see that God prevented Abimelech from committing the sin of adultery with Sarah. The phrase, "God healed Abimelech" in (Genesis 20:17), causes many scholars think that perhaps God's means of preventing sin was to strike Abimelech with some sort of disease.

- It must have seemed like a terrible affliction, but it was in fact God's mercy and kindness. Can you think of a time when God used an obstacle, affliction, or even a tragedy as a gift of mercy?
- Can you think of any other passages of scripture where God prevented people from sinning by some sort of divine intervention? (See for starters Genesis 19:11; Numbers 22:22-35; Luke 22:50-51). Can you think of a time God prevented you from succumbing to evil?

Sometimes we think that our sin is our business. We say things like, "It's my life. I'll do what I want. What's it to you?" But our sins often affect more than just us. Such was the case with Abraham.

- How did Abraham's sin affect Sarah? How did it affect Abimelech and his household?
- Can you think of an example of how the sin of someone else affected you or your family? Can you think of an example of how your sin affected others?
