THE DOCTRINE OF SALVATION - PART 3

I. Regeneration (Ezek. 36:26-27; 37:3-5; John 1:13; 3:3-8; Eph. 2:1-5; James 1:18; 1 Pet. 1:3)

1. What is regeneration?

• "The divine impartation of eternal spiritual life into the spiritually dead sinner" – John MacArthur

2. Who does the work of regeneration?

• God the Father, through the Spirit, revealing the Son, using the Word (John 3:5-6; James 1:18; 1 Pet. 1:23; 2 Thess. 2:14)

II. Conversion

1. What is conversion?

- Conversion is a response to the Gospel call, in which we repent of sin and place our faith in Christ
- **2. Repentance** (Is. 55:6-7; Acts 2:37-38; 17:30; 20:21; Rom. 2:4; 2 Cor. 7:9-10; Matt. 11:28-30)
- **3. Faith** (Acts 16:31; John 3:16; Rom. 10:9; Eph. 2:8-9)

"When our Lord and Master Jesus Christ said, 'Repent' (Mt 4:17), he willed the entire life of believers to be one of repentance." – Martin Luther

III. Justification (Rom. 3:26, 28; 5:1; 8:30, 33-34; 10:10; Gal. 2:16; 3:24)

1. What is justification?

• Justification is the legal [forensic] declaration of God that a sinner is righteous in His sight.

"Regeneration is an act of God in us; justification is a judgment of God with respect to us." – John Murray

- **2. Imputed righteousness; propitiation** (2 Cor. 5:21; Phil. 3:9; Rom. 5:19)
 - Adam's guilt imputed to us
 - Our sin imputed to Christ
 - Christ's righteousness imputed to us

- **IV.** Union with Christ (Gal. 2:20; 2 Cor. 5:14; Rom. 6:3-5; Eph. 2:6; Col. 2:12; 3:1-4)
 - 1. We have died with Christ (Gal. 2:20; 2 Cor. 5:14; Rom. 6:3-4)
 - 2. We have been raised with Christ (Rom. 6:3-4; Col. 3:1-4)
 - 3. We live in Christ; Christ lives in us (Gal. 2:20; Col. 1:27)
 - 4. We are seated with Christ in heavenly places (Eph. 2:6)

V. Sanctification

1. What is sanctification?

• The continuing work of God and man whereby a believer progressively becomes more and more like Christ.

<u>Justification</u>	Sanctification
Instantaneous	Process
Completed	Continued
Forensic declaration	Continued transformation
Objective	Subjective

- **2. Sanctification is the work of God** (1 Thess. 5:23; Eph. 5:25-27; Tit. 2:14; Phil. 1:6; 2:13; Heb. 13:20-21)
 - Specifically, it is God the Holy Spirit that works in the believer (2 Cor. 3:18; Gal. 5; Rom. 8; 1 Pet. 1:2)
- **3. Sanctification is the work of man** (Phil. 2:13; Rom. 6:12-13; 8:13; 12:1-2; 2 Cor. 7:1; 2 Peter 1:5; 1 John 3:3)
 - Specifically, it is God the Holy Spirit that works in the believer (2 Cor. 3:18; Gal. 5; Rom. 8; 1 Pet. 1:2)

4. Sanctification is progressive

- Begins at salvation (Tit. 3:5; 1 Cor. 6:11; Rom. 6:11, 14, 18)
- Continues throughout life (Phil. 1:6; 1 Cor. 1:18; 2 Cor. 3:18)
- Completed at glorification (Phil. 1:6; 1 Cor. 15:49; 1 John 3:2)

5. Sanctification is accomplished through the means of grace

- Scripture (John 17:17; Psalm 1:1-2; 119:9-11; 2 Tim. 3:16-17)
- Prayer (Phil. 4:6-7; Col. 4:2; 1 Thess. 5:17; Heb. 4:16)
- Community (Heb. 3:12-14; 10:24-25; 2 Tim. 2:22; Eph. 4:11-16)

*Important sanctification passages: Rom. 6-8; Gal. 5; Eph. 4:17-32; Phil. 2:12-13; Col 2:20-3:17; 2 Pet. 1:3-11

VI. Glorification (Rom. 8:23; Eph. 1:13-14; 1 Pet. 1:3-5; 1 John 3:2; Phil. 3:20-21)

1. What is glorification?

 Glorification is the final transformation of the believer whereby he/she becomes completely holy, never to sin again, and therefore enters into perfect communion with God the Trinity.

2. What is involved in glorification?

- Final vindication of the believer / justification realized (Rom. 5:9-10; Matt. 25:31-46)
- Moral and spiritual perfection (Col. 1:22; Eph. 1:4; Jude 24; 1 John 3:2)
- Fullness of knowledge (1 Cor. 13:12)
- Glorified bodies (Phil. 3:20-21; 2 Cor. 5:1-5; 1 Cor. 15:38-50)
